# Equity and Common Law: The Basics

## **Key Concepts**

#### **Equity**

Historically, the Court of Chancery would step in to grant claimants a remedy in instances of grave injustice that would normally have failed as claims in the common courts. Over time, the Courts developed this practice into a robust rule of equity, founded on the same principle of preventing injustice, which has persisted to the modern day and continues to evolve with the common law.

#### **Proprietary Estoppel**

An equitable remedy whereby the Courts grant party A proprietary rights in land against party B who, by way of unconscionable conduct, had sought to deny party A of rights that they themselves had led party A to believe they had.

#### **Knowing Receipt Liability**

Knowing receipt liability arises where a non-trustee receives or continues to holds trust property despite the knowledge that doing so amounts to a breach of trust.
